A **Women's Group** meets on Thursday mornings.


All Saints Tots meets on Wednesday mornings in the Village Hall.

Jimmy's opened in 1995 as Cambridge's first all year round night shelter and now offers a much wider range of support.

We may have been experiencing a Mediterranean climate in recent days but colder weather is not far off.

Jimmy's says:

Winter is a particularly difficult time for those experiencing homelessness and with rough sleeping up by 26% across the UK, alongside the cost-of-living crisis, we anticipate an increased need of our services this year.

Historically the incredible donations we have received have had a huge impact on our ability to help more people. With your support we hope this will be the case again in 2023.

We would like to ask for donations which will be used across our network of support, from our Emergency accommodation at Jimmy's East Road through to residents we continue to support as they transition into their own home homes.

All Saints has supported Jimmy's for a number of years, not least with the collection of non-perishable goods at the Harvest Service which, this year, will take place at 11am on Sunday 17th September in the marquee on the Wale Recreation Ground.

Shelford School News (September 23)

During term time Shelford School and Church Street are busy places. Some pupils arrive for Breakfast Club or extra-curricular activities (such as Choir or Triathlon) at 8am whilst the majority turn up from 8.45am ready for Registration by 8.55am.

The school bell, although still in situ, can no longer be rung. Parents have to rely on more modern means to ensure that their children are not late for school.



By 9am pre-school children are arriving for the morning session at Rainbow Pre-school* which occupies a separate building on the school site.

The formal school day is over by 3.30pm but activities continue with a range of after-school clubs, not least of which is the Wacky After-School Club**. Wacky provides after-school care from 3.30 to 6pm.

As I write this (during the month of August) Church Street is somewhat quieter. But much needed maintenance and "deep cleaning" are taking place in school and The Wacky Holiday Club is in full swing.

Thirty of our pupils have left us to go on to secondary school with the traditional Leavers' Service taking place in St Mary's Church on the last day of term. Year 6 shared memories of their 7 years at Shelford School, demonstrated their singing ability and received a Bible as a memento.

Thirty new children will be spending the summer with a mixture of emotions as they wait to join the Reception class in September. And, almost as soon as the new school year has begun, applications will open on September 11th for the admissions round for the 24/25 school year. Going Green in Shelfords, Stapleford, Sawston

Here are some forthcoming dates for your diary, hope to see you at some of them.

Nature walk on Saturday 16 September at 2pm, at Wandlebury, with naturalist John O'Boyle. Meet at the top of the car park. The walk is at your own risk, and do wear suitable clothes and footwear.

Cycle ride is on Monday 18 September. Start at 10am at Stapleford Pavilion. Booking essential, at greener@sawston.org.

Talk/conversation evening – at the time of writing this will be in Sawston at the Free Church, at 7.30pm on Monday 25 September. Two officers from SCDC will talk about small cheap ways we can all save energy, but in particular **tenants**, who cannot install solar panels, insulation, and so on. Check our website or posters then come along and get ready for cooler weather!

Save the dates - we are planning a film showing on Sunday 15 October in Whittlesford; and an energy event in the City Centre on Sunday 22 October, at which Younity, part of Octopus Energy, will talk about community energy generation, and there will be speakers and advice about reducing your home's energy usage.

Conversation/discussion evenings will also be held in November, January and February on a variety of topics, but all helping to address the cost of living as well as the climate crisis. More info on all these to come.

Repair Cafe – if you missed our last one at the Rugby Club in Great Shelford (*see photos*), the next one is on Saturday 18 November in Sawston. At the last one, our great team of repairers dealt with well over 50 items, repairing over 70% of them and helping the owners of the items understand what they were doing, in case future repairs were needed. Many of the remaining items were repairable if parts were obtained. We used the extra space at the Club for a SWISH clothes swap, which again was very successful, taking in donations of 57lbs of good-quality clothes and only being left with 19lbs to take to the Arthur Rank Hub in Sawston. There is a lovely friendly, social atmosphere at these events, helped by copious amounts of cake! Repairs and clothes were not charged for, though donations were gratefully received, as we have to pay for the premises, the hire of tool kits from Mackays, and support for Cambridge Carbon Footprint who coordinate and promote all the repair cafes in the region.



Other green matters

The BBC has shown two interesting programmes recently, one on electric cars, and the other on air source heat pumps. In each one, the technology is explained, and all the various factors that are relevant are considered. In the case of the heat pump programme, they look at alternatives for heating homes (such as hydrogen), electricity generation, whether the national grid can cope, with interviews and case studies. We are almost at the end of the season as I write and our teams are having a great season so far and we are reaping the rewards of the effort in recent years to build our teams across the Senior and Junior categories. It is well proven that a strong Junior Section is key to success in Village Cricket, providing experience at all levels and providing a clear route for Juniors to play in the Senior Teams



Senior Teams Performance

The 1st XI finished top of the CCA Junior League 1 South and so we will be promoted to CCA Senior League Division 3 next season. Fantastic and consistent performances in bowling and batting is the key to 1st team success along with great Captaincy from Matthew Beale, who certainly leads from the front with his bowling. This also means we will be playing in the County Final Playoff between the North and South Division winners on the 9th September. By the time you read this we hope to have triumphed!

The 2nd XI Senior Team have had a more difficult season but this has been partly as a result of a reorganisation of the leagues at their level at the end of last season which saw them put into a stronger league than the players felt they were ready for. However, the team spirit has remained strong and under the leadership of Alistair Pringle and Rupert Beale progress has been made. This meant they avoided relegation and finished 7th in the CCA Junior League 3 South. The Captain and Vice-Captain are confident the team's improved performance will continue into next season.

History Snippet: Little Shelford's very own Brewery

I have tried to establish the history of our very own Brewery. We know the Village had a Brewery at some point as we commonly refer to the "Brewers House" on the Corner of Newton Road and Hauxton Road and we refer to the "Brewers Cottages", the row of 19th Century Terraced Brick Cottages along Hauxton Road from the junction of Newton Road. But when did the Brewery open and what happened to it? The history of its rise and demise can be found in various sources including the British Newspaper Archive.

British History On-Line – Little Shelford Entry

"Arthur Austin (d. 1908), whose family had been long established in the area as windmill builders, farmed at Little Shelford from the 1890s. He was also a lime and coprolite merchant, and before 1875 he built a brewery on the Hauxton road. He may also have run a foundry for a time in the parish. (fn. 120) The brewery was disused in 1916 and had been demolished by 1966".

This is a good start and if we look at the Little Shelford census records, we can see Arthur Austin living at Cherry Cottage in Newton Road in 1871 (Age 41) and working as a Lime Merchant. He must have been reasonably prosperous at the time as well as there were 5 children and a servant living in the Cottage. But when is there a first mention of the West End Brewery? Well, the earliest reference I can find is in 1873 when Arthur Austin, by now a Brewer, accused an employee of theft (see the first article below). By the time of the Census of 1881 Arthur Austin (Age 51) and his family have taken up residence at the "West End Brewery" in Little Shelford, presumably what we know now as the Brewers House. The census notes that Arthur Austin is a Farmer (farming 158 Acres and employing 6 men and a boy) as well as a being a Brewer. So, it looks like Arthur Austin built the brewery between 1871 and 1873.

In 1892 the Brewery was let to Oliver St. John, and it was this action which resulted in the West End Brewery's sad demise, although by then it was known as the Phoenix Brewery. Oliver St. John came from a wealthy family in Dulwich, South London. In 1861 (Age 3) he was living in Dulwich with his father, Frederick St John, and many siblings and

servants. Frederick St. John, who was the Surveyor General of Customs, was related to George Richard St John, 3rd Viscount Bolingbroke and 4th Viscount St John.

But, as the story unfolds in the pages of our local papers we see that Oliver St John did not have a particularly good business acumen and this led to the Brewery's sad demise! The story of Oliver St John's involvement with local brewing starts in Whittlesford in 1887 and ends with bankruptcy in Little Shelford in 1894.

Cambridge Chronicle and Journal - Friday 16 February 1894 – Phoenix Brewery Bankruptcy

*CAMBRIDGE BANKRUPTCY COURT. Oliver St. John, of the Phoenix Brewery, Little Shelford, brewer, trading as Saunders and Co and residing at Great Shelford. In answer to the Official Receiver (Mr. J. Ellison) debtor said he commenced business about six years ago at Whittlesford, in succession to Messrs. Saunders and Co., from whom he purchased the business for £4,600. Of that sum the debtor borrowed £3,500 from his brother, the Rev. E. St John. **The trade at Whittlesford did not realise his expectations, and during the five years he remained there lost every penny of his capital.***

*In March 1892, he rented the **Phoenix Brewery at Little Shelford**, and his brother lent him a further sum of £500. From that time to this had had other advances from his brother, making a total of about £8,000. The whole of the money had gone. He was pressed by his brother for security in December 1892, and debtor gave him bill of sale upon the brewery plant and other things.*

No money was paid under the bill of sale and the result was his brother had put the bill of sale in force. An execution was put in at the same time, and that compelled Oliver St John to file his petition in bankruptcy. He had known for some considerable time past that his financial position had been very much crippled. The money advanced by his brother was not intended as a gift to him. His deficiency of £9,000 and was as the result of unsuccessful trading.

Parish Council News




