

from Rev Edward Keene, Curate of Little Shelford



Dear friends,

6 February is marked across the Commonwealth as Accession Day; a sad day for our sovereign as it is the anniversary of her father's death, but also a momentous one—especially in this, her Platinum Jubilee year. We look forward to great celebrations here in Shelford marking the Jubilee weekend, scheduled for later in the year. An advert from the parish council for volunteers to assist may be found on page 10.

70 years is a remarkable achievement. It is twice the length of time that yours truly has been in existence! Our Queen had been on the throne for almost two decades before mankind set foot on the moon. Even though the Cold War ended over thirty years ago, more of her reign occurred during it than after it. Only three other sovereign rulers in all of recorded history have enjoyed longer reigns—and within two years all of them will also be eclipsed, should Elizabeth Windsor persevere (which we certainly pray she will do).

How many people singing 'Long live our noble Queen' in 1952 would have imagined quite how that sung prayer would be answered. The previous Queen Regnant for whom that form of words had last been sung half a century earlier had enjoyed the blessing of 63 years on the throne. Her great-great granddaughter has been blessed even further.

Rather more ambitious than 'long life' was the Babylonian royal acclamation 'May the King life forever'. The congregations at All Saints church were reminded of this refrain at the end of last year, as we read through the book of Daniel (he of the Lion's Den fame) and found the prophet himself obliged to greet his ruler in this extravagant fashion. Whereas our anthem is a call for blessing, that ancient refrain was a bold claim on deity itself.

We may imagine that many of Daniel's associates in the court of ancient Babylon uttered the royal greeting through gritted teeth, privately dreaming of the day their overlord passed to his grave. Though most of us today can sing 'Long live the Queen' in good conscience, there are some with a genuinely negative experience of the monarchy. Elizabeth II may have ruled gently and quietly, but has not always done so perfectly. She is, like us, only human after all.

There is however one ruler for whom a prayer for everlasting reign is not out of place. Your throne O God is forever and ever' declares Psalm 45. This is a palatable concept, even for the more republican-minded amongst us, as the Psalm goes on to affirm 'The sceptre of your kingdom is a sceptre of uprightness.'

Little Shelford wholeheartedly congratulates Her Majesty on her long reign and will do so, no doubt, in style come the early Summer Bank Holiday. But whilst doing so, let us remember the one whom we address as we sing again the royal anthem and on whom length of days for each of us, whether king or commoner, ultimately depends.

#### Book Review: Lupus, you odd unnatural thing

Shaista Tayabali's newly published book, *Lupus*, *you odd unnatural thing*, had a long gestation, but like elephants, it's worth the wait. It is a brave and candid account of Shaista's experience of living with Lupus (the 'odd unnatural thing' of the title) for most of her life. Lupus is a complex, debilitating disease, but one where the individual can look quite healthy to the casual observer or even (as Shaista discloses in a very amusing description) to the very professionals in whose care she finds herself.



The book takes the form of biography which, although heart-breaking at times, is also full of sharp observation and shines with Shaista's love of family and of many of the people she encounters. We can all learn much from the descriptions of the dehumanising treatments, the pain, the anger, and the impotence that can accompany chronic illness. These jostle with observations of the NHS and the way it works, with fascinating accounts of interactions with those she meets on her journey which abound with love and compassion, and which can also be very funny. If all this sounds a bit intimidating, the writing is magical, even musicaldrawing on Shaista's love of poetry and the written word across the literary and artistic cultures of her Indian heritage and her very English educa-

This book should be prescribed read-

ing for every junior doctor or nurse; as a nurse for over 40 years researching another complex and misunderstood disease, ME, there was so much I could relate to and much to learn. More than that, it is delightfully crafted, and a captivating read. The skill with which she weaves the most banal moments into a tapestry, incisive and sharp, celebrating life, conveying pain, and inspiring a resulting ironic joy, is as artful as most anything I have read. I could not recommend it more highly.

What a privilege it is to have Shaista resident in Little Shelford!

#### Granta Medical Practices Update February 2022

#### **Covid Vaccine Update**

On 13 December 2021 the government announced that the deadline for every adult to have been offered a covid booster was being brought forward from 31 January 2022 to 31 December 2021. Granta staff stepped forward to support the "Omicron Emergency Booster National Mission" to encourage everyone who is eligible to "get boosted now".

Between 15 December and 3 January an extra 7,000 Granta patients were vaccinated. Staff worked the 3 bank holidays, in addition to squeezing extra vaccine clinics into their normal working days, to ensure that as many patients as possible were vaccinated before the new deadline passed.

#### New Hospital Helpline for Patients

The Covid-19 pandemic has added to the strain on all NHS services. As a result of this, waiting list times for outpatient and specialist appointments and procedures have increased for everybody.

This can cause worry and uncertainty about when you will eventually receive an appointment, and unfortunately Granta has no direct access to the hospital appointment lists.

If you have been referred by your GP / are waiting for:

- An outpatient appointment
- An appointment for hospital tests (e.g. scans)
- A date for an operation or other treatment
- A follow-up from your hospital team

and you have a query about what is happening, there is now a new dedicated Freephone Patient Help Line - 0800 048 5800.

May we respectfully ask that you only call Granta if your condition has genuinely deteriorated, when you will be reviewed by one of the clinical team and appropriate action can be taken in regard to your hospital care. Thank you for your continued understanding, patience and support.

#### Green Groups in the Shelfords, Stapleford & Sawston (2G3S)

It's the new year again. How about some green resolutions this year?

#### 1.Reduce energy use in the home and save money

Simple changes such as remembering to put a lid on saucepans, turning off electrical items (not just using standby) and turning down the thermostat to the WHO recommended 18°C are free and easy habits to make. For lots of great ideas for personalised home energy advice look up CCF.

#### 2.Use active or public transport where you can

Replacing short car journeys with walking or cycling benefits our own health, saves fuel and money, and improves air quality. How about replacing one car journey a week, or 10% a year, with cycling, walking or taking public transport?

#### 3.Reduce, reuse, recycle

In that order! Everything we buy has an energy and resource cost at each stage of its production, transportation and disposal. Do you really need it? If so, can you get it secondhand or borrow/share? Think when buying something about whether it can be used lots of times and repaired. Even recycling has an energy cost so should be seen as a last resort. Make your own compost, reduce food waste and support the circular economy.

#### 4.Help wildlife where you live

Did you know that in the UK urban gardens total more hectares of land than all the nature reserves added together? If we all gardened for wildlife, just imagine what positive impact we would have, then add in all the land in verges, roundabouts etc. Native plants are best for native wildlife. Check out the RHS website for lists of pollinator-friendly plants for your garden/window box and other top tips, and The Wildlife Trusts for ideas on how to garden for wildlife.

#### 5.Save water

Only 1% of the water on our planet is fresh, salt-free and available to us in streams and underground reserves. It is essential to life. We only drink around 5% of the water we use, the other 95% goes down the drain from showers, taps, laundries and toilets or into the garden. To get clean drinking water to our taps costs energy to extract it, pipe it, clean it and then pipe it and clean it again (hopefully!) before it heads back to the rivers. In Cambridgeshire the water is taken from the chalk aquifer, the ever-increasing demand for which is so high that not enough is left to flow down our rare and important chalk streams, causing them to dry up, which harms local biodiversity.

Great and Little Shelford CE(A) Primary School is looking to appoint a Clerk to the Governors, to provide efficient and effective administrative support in their vital strategic role. The successful candidate will be highly organised, provides attention to detail, is reliable and has excellent communication skills. The clerk prepares meeting papers, takes

minutes and carries out a range of administrative tasks for the Board so flexibility in working hours is necessary. As the operation of the Board is paperless, computer literacy is essential and familiarity with Google Drive would be helpful.



#### Kenneth William Starling 1927 - 2021



Kenneth (Ken) Starling (Mr Starling to many) was head of Shelford School from 1975 to 1988. He died on the 8th of December 2021. Below are extracts from the address given at his funeral service with additional material from Marjorie Westbrook's book, *The Making of a Village School* (pp 103-11).

Born in Cambridge in 1927, an only child, Ken was of the "war-time" generation whose Army service was in the Royal Signals rising to sergeant. After the war and its aftermath he went into education, training in Abingdon and from there to Arbury Road Junior School as his first post. There he met and eventually married his wife Margaret with whom he had 2 children. Ken also taught at Morley Memorial School before becoming head of Shelford School in 1975.

Former pupils may recall Ken's passion for aeroplanes, his clarinet playing in the school orchestra, the woodworking lessons he gave (boys only), his leading of the "School Walk" along the Roman Road not to mention his encouragement to "keep on walking" during the Year 6 the Pennine Trip. Following his retirement Ken and Margaret moved to Bury St Edmunds where he maintained those same interests - even obtaining a pilot's licence.

As educational expectations changed during Ken's tenure many of the school's facilities we now take for granted were acquired, not least the large playing field.

But maybe his lasting legacy will be the hundreds, if not thousands, of young lives he influenced and helped as a teacher.

## Q: What is the connection between Shelford, Madagascar, and hovercraft?




On the 18th January the Kaleidoscope group at All Saints faced the question, "What do you know about Madagascar?" Most people responded, "Lemurs", one person said, "Vanilla" but the rest kept very quiet.

However, by the end of the meeting and a fascinating and challenging talk by John Greaves, Shelford resident and Chief Executive of the international charity HoverAid, we had learnt quite a lot about the country, its people and their needs and the work of

the charity in that country. Because so much of Madagascar cannot be reached by car, boat or aeroplane HoverAid uses hovercraft (hence the name) to conduct its relief work - reaching the unreachable.

#### We also learnt that...





doubling every 15 years. It is one of the poorest countries in the world, as well as being stunningly beautiful. 90% of all its wildlife species are unique to the island

- 50% of the people suffer from malnutrition and the median age is 19
- 80% of the rainforests have been destroyed, mainly to enable subsistence farming
- HoverAid carries out emergency aid following frequent floods and cyclones, as well as supporting rebuilding of communities and provision of water wells and sanitation

# Sunday Services at All Saints Parish Church (in-person and online)

#### **Shelford School**

At the time of writing the new term has started amidst all the wider news about record rates of Covid infection. The school has CO2 monitors, but as yet no air purifiers. Things could very easily change by the time this is printed, but at present all the regular school activities are continuing, in the modified ways that have been developing throughout the pandemic. Staff have shown their adaptability throughout, and I am sure that will continue to be to the fore when we eventually emerge from the constraints. We can be thankful that things look massively better than this time last year when the school had to close to nearly all pupils.



Events at the end of the autumn term were centred around the nativity and carols by candle-light, with wonderful reflections by staff and pupils through reading, music and performance. And the excitement of Christmas was not forgotten, with the school "Christmas Day" on the last day of term. A collection around these events raised a tremen-

dous total of £507 which was sent to Save the Children. Then at the start of the spring term we marked the end of the Christmas season with collective worship for Epiphany – via Zoom, of course.

We have now said farewell to the Reverend Simon Talbott, but are hoping that he will in due course find some way to include a visit to us in association with his new role supporting the Bishop in Ely. He served the governors and the school with great energy and commitment for over eight years, and the governors were delighted to present Simon with tokens of our appreciation, including a framed art map of the Shelfords and Stapleford. We look forward to learning in due course who will take on the mantle at St Mary's; we are very grateful for the support that we receive from all three churches in the Shelfords.
