

I was pleased to hear that meteorologically we are on the verge of beginning the season of spring, at the time of writing: it didn't feel much like that, with frost lying crisply on the ground! In fact, the day was mentioned as an anniversary day in one of my favourite books: The Cambridge Book of Days – a daily feast of local trivia and memories.

It was, I discovered, on February 28<sup>th</sup> 1953, 78 years ago, that two scientists, Francis Crick and James Watson raced into The Eagle pub in Benet's Street, Cambridge, announcing that they had discovered 'the secret of life'.

I gather that people were rather underwhelmed in the pub at the time by their announcement. But we now know that they had made one of the most significant discoveries of the  $20^{th}$  century.

The double helix shape of DNA has not only given us a pattern for the bike-path from Addenbrookes to Shelford – now slightly dilapidated (!); much more significantly, it spawned a whole new science of molecular biology, explaining how genes are passed down through the generations.



However true, biologically speaking, the claim of Crick and Watson to have discovered the 'secret of life' was, as the Rector of Little Shelford, I would want to flag up that there is more to life than what we can analyse scientifically in a test-tube.

We begin this week not just meteorological spring but the season of Lent, running for forty days up to Easter... Traditionally it is a time for reflection and for opening ourselves up to God, with a willingness to change, or even repent – to restore Jesus Christ to his rightful place on the throne of our lives.

Let me invite you to rediscover the 'secret to spiritual life' over the next few weeks. If he died on the cross on Good Friday so that our sins can be forgiven and rose from the dead on Easter Day never to die again – then we can enjoy in him a whole new world of spiritual life.

Maybe that will have you running down the High Street to tell people in the Side Quest the wonderful news you have discovered!

# SSYI Spring 2025 Update

What is SSYI? We are a community-based charity founded by local Christians serving the villages of Great and Little Shelford, Stapleford, Sawston and Duxford.



What do we do? We provide youth activities and clubs open to all local 11–18-year-olds. We particularly focus on those who are marginalised, isolated, at-risk or not accessing other youth provision.

Over the winter months activities have included our regular sessions in Great Shelford, Sawston and Duxford, attracting well over 100 young people each week. We also ran 21 weekly 1:1 sessions for young people at Sawston Village College and in the local Community. In the run up to Christmas we ran a bowling trip with our Deeper group and took 18 young people to the Winter Wonderland on Parkers Piece. We were also involved in the Shelford light switch on and set up the football cage which despite the cold was a great success.

# Spring 2025 Plans

With Spring fast approaching, alongside our regular sessions, we are hoping to run a number of trips and activities in the half term and Easter Holidays, including another trip to the Gauntlet and a trip to F51 skatepark. For our regular program schedule visit: <u>www.ssyi.club</u>

Funding for SSYI is a continuous challenge and currently costs over  $\pounds$ 140,000 per year to run. We get funding from our Parish Councils, Local Churches, the Village Feast and put a lot of effort into obtaining other Grant funds. One of our most reliable sources is private regular private giving. We have only 22 supporters who give regularly but, there are over 15,000 adult residents in the Villages we serve so it's a tiny proportion who support us in this way. We need your help and want to encourage you to become a regular donor. In doing so you will get regular updates on our work. We are also looking for more volunteers, especially for the regular weekly sessions. # **Granta Medical Practices Update February 2025**

As I write this, the NHS is again in the throes of extreme winter pressures due to high levels of infectious diseases such as flu, Covid, RSV and norovirus. Help stop the spread by following the three C's:

**CLEAN:** Wash your hands often, using soap and warm water or use an alcohol-based hand rub

**COVER:** Cover your mouth and nose when you cough and sneeze. Use a tissue or your upper sleeve, not your hands.

**CONTAIN:** If you get sick, stay home until you're well again. Try not to spread your germs to others.

Don't forget you can treat many minor illnesses at home with a wellstocked medicine cabinet. Colds and coughs, sore throats, and upset stomachs can all be treated by having a supply of health care essentials such as pain relief (paracetamol / ibuprofen), cough and sore throat remedies, a first aid kit, upset stomach treatment, rehydration treatment and heartburn / indigestion treatment.

And finally ... it isn't too late to get a flu jab – they are available until the end of March – just give us a ring to book your appointment!

# 2G3S Going Green in Shelfords, Stapleford, Sawston

**Litter Picks** – there is one in Stapleford on Sunday 2 March, meet at 2pm by the Pavilion, and bring gloves and a picker (grab stick) if you have them. And there will be one in Sawston on Saturday 8 March at 10am, gather at the Small Town Café at Ashwell Point opposite Lynton Way recreation ground (along Babraham Road, CB22 3LJ) - it is the 60s style building at the front of the industrial estate. Again, if you have gloves and a picker please bring along. If you have a high-vis vest it would be a good idea to wear it for safety reasons.

**Dr Bike** continues to run its volunteer-run weekly bike repair sessions at the Old Slaughterhouse in Stapleford, 3pm to 5.30pm every Tuesday. Children are welcome to come and learn how to look after their bikes and do simple maintenance and repairs, but please attend with them (for safeguarding reasons). Maybe you've been trying to eat more healthily in 2025. You might have heard the phrase 'eat 30 different plants a week' rather than the five-a-day recommendation. You can boost this number by sprinkling seeds on a salad or on a quiche, or adding to a casserole or pasta dish; cook with different herbs; or eat multi-grain/multi-seed bread. 'Eat a rainbow' is another mantra you may have heard - this means eat lots of different coloured fruit and vegs, as they contain various antioxidants and other compounds that are useful to your body. Another thing to bear in mind if you are reducing your meat intake is to ensure you have enough iron – green vegs like spinach, chard, and kale contain it, and absorption can be boosted by having vitamin C at the same meal e.g.by using a citrus dressing on the greens, or having an orange for dessert. You may be trying to buy local food, and this will reduce food miles (i.e. the number of miles between farm and fork), supports the local economy, strengthens food security by shortening the supply chain, is fresher and therefore more nutritious, and helps to build the local community.

And if you can get organic, even better. When crops are sprayed with pesticides you absorb a little of it yourself. Wildlife is reduced when strong pesticides are used. The neonicotinoids that have been officially banned (but in this area are often allowed for use on sugar beet) disorientate bees if they don't kill them – and one teaspoon is enough to kill over a billion honeybees! Organic farmers do use pesticides, but they tend to be less harmful ones and used in a very targeted way, or they will use another method e.g. a mulch to control weeds, or a natural predator for a pest. And antibiotics are only given to livestock on an organic farm if they are ill, never as a preventative measure. This helps to slow down the resistance that many bacteria are developing to antibiotics, due to their overuse.

# The Shelfords WI

We were very pleased in early February to welcome Dr Caroline Shenton who had been Director of Archives at the Houses of Parliament to tell us about 'The Day Parliament Burned Down'.

Soon after starting in that position, she looked for early records of the 800 year old royal palace that preceded our current and iconic House of Parliament, which was then adapted for parliamentary use. Nearly all records were lost in a massive fire that started on 16<sup>th</sup> October 1834 and ravaged the House of Lords, House of Commons and the adiacent Law Courts and Chancery buildings. She put together the story of the layout and use of the buildings before the fire, immediately after and since the rebuilding of the current parliament building. She illustrated her story with excellent images of the buildings, both drawings and two watercolours by JMW Turner who was an eyewitness. Charles Dickens was a young journalist in 1834 and used his personal memory of the fire in several novels including Oliver Twist. Luckily the wind blew the flames and smoke towards the Thames and away from Westminster Abbey. The stonework of some of the old mediaeval buildings survived the fire but only Westminster Hall was reroofed and incorporated into the new building of 1847.

We were privileged to have such a well-qualified and brilliant speaker giving a totally absorbing talk.

At the next WI meeting at 7.30 pm on Thursday 6 March a talk by Sarah Harrison will be titled 'You couldn't make it up' (a look at life) followed by a refreshment break and short AGM. As usual, visitors or prospective new members will be very welcome.

# Annual Hedgerow Deep Clean Update

Councillor David Jones reports that on the weekend of 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> February villagers turned out to help with the annual hedgerow deep clean along the roads approaching and in the village. There was also a big tidy up on the SCOWP Jubilee Orchard and Meadow and the Allotments on Blennies Patch. Many thanks are due to the 20 or so volunteers who between Saturday and Sunday collected the rubbish.

So much rubbish in fact that we filled the skip on Blennies Patch quickly and the Parish Council are in the process of organising a second skip to collect the remaining rubbish. We will let Allotment Holders and the SCOWP team know when this is to happen.



More alarmingly, it became very clear during

the litter pick on the approach roads to the Village, particularly Newton Road, that the habit of drivers throwing cans, bottles and other food wrappers and waste out of car windows is becoming more and more rife. The litter pick teams found over 150 cans and bottles (including several broken bottles) between the last house on Newton Road heading out of the village up to the Motorway Bridge where Newton Road becomes Shelford Road. A quick look at what lay beyond the motorway bridge on the Shelford Road was also quiet shocking but we ran out of time and volunteers to proceed further.

So, the PC have decided to organise another litter pick specifically to attack the rubbish between the Motorway Bridge and the junction of the Newton Road/Shelford Road with London Road. The date is not yet fixed but it will be before Easter and we will advertise the event on local noticeboards and on the Village Facebook page.

It is illegal to throw litter out of motor vehicles or to drop litter while walking. Offenders could receive a £400 fixed penalty notice (FPN) or be taken to court and fined up to £2,500. (The £400 FPN can be reduced to £240 if paid within 10 days, however, this lesser amount is discretionary and can be withheld by the council in certain cases).

## Peter Pan the Pantomime, or was it the rehearsal?

From the pre-recorded safety announcement right up to Eleanor Harris-Wright's final "woof" as Nana, *Peter Pan* had the audience smiling and laughing throughout.

This year's pantomime was a Little Shelford script debut for Miles Cragg, depicting a rehearsal for a production of *Peter Pan*, beset with problems – from the lost 'Lost Boys' who spend most of the production trying to make their way back to Shelford from London, to missing props, problems with the set and issues with the sound effects and music. While the usual panto puns and audience participation were present, they were given a fresh, new twist, with the audience at one point finding themselves declaring that they wanted to go home! Oh no we don't!

Directors Dick Wallin and Heidi Meikle created a production which allowed all the youngsters to shine and Francess Richardson's brilliant artistic talent treated the audience to three beautiful backdrops. The sound team did a fantastic job, from timing the amusing bell ringing which accompanied Imogen Butler Burd and May Sillence's comical entrances as the fairies Doorbell and Schoolbell, to the wonderful scene between Raleigh (Alexander Hunter) and Columbus (Tommy Haworth) as they rehearsed with a pistol – theatrical comedy at its finest!

The costumes really brought the characters to life. The seagull chorus were a spectacle to behold: resplendent in white hoodies and leg



warmers and accompanied on stage by a human-sized ice-cream. The glitz and glamour of Trinny and Susannah (Millie Kennedy and Ella Guron) was magnificent, their costumes enhancing the fabulously stylish characters created by the actors.

The singing this year was second to none, thanks to Lucy Barlow and Miles Cragg's musical direction and a very talented cast. When the whole cast came together to sing, the audience could not help but feel moved, particularly during the rendition of 'You Will be Found'. Maddie Young, as put-upon Assistant Director, Steph, led the cast in a fantastic performance of 'Nine to Five', dazzling the audience with her singing and dancing. The pirates' performance of 'With Cat Like Tread' was also excellent.

Harry Chatwin and Joseph Morris were splendid as this season's Panto Dames, humorous in their bickering and disagreements but showcasing the genuine beauty of their singing in the scene where Hook sat nestled between them as they fought for his affection.



Thomas Welchman's depiction of Captain Hook was impressive as he switched personality traits: one moment cruelly reprimanding his poor first-mate, Smee (Dougie Carrothers); the next, crying for his mummies! Their duet, 'Good old Captain Hook', was fabulous.



Scarlett Wilkinson made a brilliantly bossy Peter Pan, commanding the stage as she chastised her poor Shadow all night! Their skilfully synchronised duet, 'Me and My Shadow' was superbly choreographed and wonderfully executed by both. Dougie - cast both as the sad, suffering Shadow and the sycophantic yet disgruntled Smee -

communicated the displeasure of both characters with inventive facial expressions.

Emma Russell made a wonderful Wendy, her happy enthusiasm and innocence offset brilliantly by moments of cutting cynicism and mischief: questioning the existence of Neverland; challenging Peter as to whether he could really be happy in a place without Netflix;



and offering – somewhat threateningly – to sew on Peter's shadow while brandishing an over-sized needle. Ouch!

Hannah Pulford's Tinkerbell was inspired. From the moment she dragged herself through the window into the Darling nursery in Act 1, only to be told to go back as they were going to start the scene again, Hannah conveyed the weary frustration and exasperation that brought so much humour to the role.

And there were so many more amazing performances! Emilia Munoz made a fantastically formidable and demanding Director, deflating the other characters' efforts with a withering look. Beatrice White and

Isabella Young had a wonderful onstage rapport in their roles as the Shakespearean crocodiles. Both sets of Lost Boys brought much humour to the stage: the workmen's refusal to give up their day jobs contrasting with the childhood innocence of the original lost boys. Miles McCrone elicited much empathy from the audience as the leftbehind Lost Boy, Hawkeye, receiving an enthusiastic cheer when he was finally reunited with the others. Finally, the chorus gave us a glimpse of the upcoming talent with their poetry recitations and musical numbers. The future looks promising.



To describe this as a village pantomime does not do it justice. The standard was incredible. I am already looking forward to next year. Oh yes, I am!

# Parish Council response to EWR non-statutory consultation

# Introduction

At the Parish Council we remain opposed to the EWR decision to take a southern approach to Cambridge. We continue to support the work of Cambridge Approaches and others in trying to reverse this decision through detailed analysis and challenge.

It is important that we respond in detail about the potential impact of EWR's plans on Little Shelford. We held a drop-in session in December to hear villager's views.

As you will know, EWR would close the Hauxton Road level crossing and their consultation specifically asks for opinions about whether we would support the provision of a pedestrian bridge, as well as the planned new road crossing the railway to join Newton Road.

During the consultation period it became clear that such a bridge might be used less than envisaged, because of its long ramps. The Parish Council decided to get the views of those most directly affected by the level crossing closure, on Hauxton Road between Newton Road and the M11, and Moor Close. Questionnaires were delivered to more than 65 households and we received 28 completed responses. In the vast majority of cases the respondent said they would make regular use of a pedestrian bridge. Consequently, the PC continue to support the provision of a pedestrian bridge, but with reservations.

## **Our response to the Consultation**

This is what the PC said about the pedestrian bridge in its consultation response (Q19b):

"Little Shelford Parish Council (LSPC) is not convinced that it is necessary to close the Hauxton Road level crossing. Our experience is that, with the current 12 movements an hour, each causing the barriers to be lowered for 30 seconds, there are no traffic delays. This would not change significantly with the addition of 8 further trains an hour. If there are reasons why the current crossing type (half barrier) is not suitable, then EWR need to be clearer why that is the case.

Closing the level crossing will have the effect of splitting the Little Shelford community. We are pleased to see that a new road is planned, but this only provides connectivity. It will not compensate for the social isolation of those living on the west side of the railway. A new pedestrian bridge would help to compensate for this social split. It would also provide access from either side of Hauxton Road to any active travel corridor heading towards Cambridge.

In order to gauge potential usage of a new pedestrian bridge, LSPC sent out a questionnaire to those households most likely to be affected by the closure of the level crossing (Moor Close and most of Hauxton Road). There was a good response, sufficient to provide some consensus:

• Residents don't see that the increase in rail traffic necessitates closing the level crossing

• Almost 90% would use a new pedestrian bridge, but there is some strong opposition to having one

- Around half of pedestrian bridge users say they would use it to access Hauxton Road or Moor Close addresses on the other side of the railway – i.e. very close to them

• There is positive interest in new 'active' paths that provide connectivity toward Cambridge

LSPC is dismayed by the size, usability (due to the ramp length), visual impact and industrial style of the proposed pedestrian bridge.

• We urge EWR to look at further design options to enhance its usability. Highways design standard CD 353 does allow higher ramp gradients in special circumstances, which surely apply here. Adding steps could also increase its usage

• The height of the bridge is obviously fixed but the crossing point needs to be moved as far from Hauxton Road as possible to protect the privacy of nearby residents. For the same reason, the bridge should be screened on the southern side

• Pedestrian safety in the dark should be enhanced with the provision of movement activated lighting

LSPC strongly supports the provision of the pedestrian bridge because it helps to maintain the local community and potentially provides connectivity to a wider network but is not satisfied with its design. EWR need to continue engaging with the local community to develop further options before the statutory consultation."

There will be other consequences within Little Shelford. The Parish Council responded to Q20 as follows:

"EWR have made encouraging noises about supporting active travel. The area around Little Shelford is poorly served for foot and cycle paths. If EWR are able to make a substantive improvement in offroad connectivity locally that would be positive factor for local residents. A desirable new route would be one that ran alongside the railway towards Cambridge, connecting with the permissive path at the Rectory farm level crossing, and reaching the 'DNA' path off Granhams Road. Connectivity via the pedestrian bridge at Hauxton Road would make it accessible from Hauxton or the Shelfords.

LSPC is pleased to see that EWR have recognised the need for a redesign of the junction between Hauxton Road and Newton Road, when the latter will be carrying considerably more traffic. This junction, and the nearby one between Church St and Hauxton Road/High Street are the sites of some historic village buildings. Further work is required on the impact of changing traffic flows before the statutory consultation.

The parish council has been monitoring traffic speeds for a number of years. Traffic coming into the village along Newton Road is consistently far too fast in the built-up area. LSPC request that EWR add a mini roundabout where the new road meets Newton Road. This would have the effect of slowing inbound traffic, essential for traffic management and road safety.

The plans for the reworking of London Road / Shelford Road junction caused by the new London Road bridge crossing the railway appear unduly complex.

The planned construction compound on Newton Road to the east of the M11 will be a significant blight for local homeowners. EWR should consider making use of land on the other side of the M11, where there are no residents. LSPC would like this area to be returned as amenity land when construction is complete."

# History Snippet: 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of VE Day

On 8 May 2025, we mark the **80th anniversary of VE Day**, our nation will unite to celebrate 80 years of peace since the end of World War II in Europe. VE Day 80 is not only a tribute to those who fought and died for freedom but also a powerful reminder of the resilience and unity that have defined our country ever since. **At** 



9:30pm, on the 8<sup>th</sup> May beacons and Lamp Lights of Peace will shine across the United Kingdom and this would be a good time to pause and honour the war dead listed on our memorial.

As our contribution to the commemorations, we are carrying out research with the History Society to enhance or knowledge of those from the Village who lost their lives during World War II and whose names appear on our War Memorial at All Saints Church. We want to honour their memory by putting as much information as possible, including photos, on our Village History website along with the information we have found about our World War I war dead, also honoured on the Memorial.

The most comprehensive information readily available about those listed on the war memorial is found at the "Roll of Honour" web site. We have started our research and include additional information already found below this listing.

### The Tragic Death of Dora Ellen BAILEY

Our first research focus was on the only female listed on our War Memorial from either World War I or World War II. Polly Stanton, a member of All Saints Church, took up the challenge of researching her death. This was not so easy. The NAAFI (Navy Army & Air Force Institutes) is a company created by the government on 9 December 1920 to run recreational establishments needed by the armed forces and to sell goods to servicemen and their families. It still runs clubhouses, bars, shops, supermarkets, cafés and other facilities on most British military bases and also canteens on board Royal Navy ships. The NAAFI provided important support to our servicemen and women during World War II but because they were regarded as a civilian organisation their record keeping on death in service was not maintained in the same way as the military.

However, thanks to Polly's diligent research we did discover how Dora BAILEY had met her death. Polly found an article in the Mercury and Herald Newspaper of Northampton dated Friday October 2<sup>nd</sup> 1942.

Sadly, Dora was involved in a road accident while walking out in the evening with Private Leonard Newton near Finedon, Northamptonshire on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> September 1942. They were both hit by an RAF Lorry driven by a civilian driver but Dora died of her injuries. She and her family lived on the Hauxton Road in Little Shelford. A tragic accident but if were not for the war, no doubt Dora would not have been in Northampton. Dora was one of seven children and at the time of the 1939 War Census she was living at 44 Hauxton Road with her Mother, Sarah and three of her brothers including Frederick who is mentioned in the article. She is buried in the Churchyard of All Saints, Little Shelford. The article is replicated here.
