What's on at All Saints

All Saints is a friendly, informal church family in the village of Little Shelford. We're always glad to have visitors, so whether you're investigating Christianity, looking for a church to settle into or just visiting the area, you are welcome to join us at a Sunday service.

Details of services and other activities may be found on the All Saints website. Go to www.allsaintslittleshelford.org or scan this code:



The usual pattern of Sunday services is:

9.30 am - A family service where adults and children join together for the first half hour before children leave for their own teaching groups:

All Saints Minis (0-Year 1), All Saints Kids (Year 2-6), Pathfinders (age 11-14).

11.00 am - A quieter, more reflective service.

6.00 pm - Sunday @ 6 is a relaxed and informal service with contemporary songs. All Saints Youth, the group for 14 to 18 year olds, meets before this service.

During school holidays and at special times of the year (e.g., Christmas and Easter) the pattern of services and activities may change.

Services during the summer holiday (between 27th July and 31st August) will be at 10am and 6pm.

Regular Mid-week Activities

Home Groups meet for Bible study, prayer and fellowship on Monday and Wednesday evenings and Wednesday afternoon.

A **Church Prayer Meeting** replaces Home Groups once a month.

A **Women's Group** meets on Thursday mornings.

All Saints Tots meets on Wednesday mornings in the Village Hall.

Kaleidoscope, a group for older members of the church, meets once a month on a Tuesday morning.

All Saints Youth meets for a mid-week Bible study on some Tuesday evenings.

Granta Medical Practices Update May 2025

As you will be aware, GP surgeries and hospitals continue to experience increased patient demand. Between us all, we can help alleviate some of that demand by using alternative health services where appropriate.

Your local pharmacy can also offer treatments and prescribe medication for some conditions without you needing to see your GP. This service is called Pharmacy First and conditions that can be treated and prescribed for include:

- Earache (aged 1 to 17 years)
- Impetigo (aged 1 year and over)
- Infected insect bites (aged 1 year and over)
- Shingles (aged 18 and over)
- Sinusitis (aged 12 years and over)
- Sore throat (aged 5 years and over)
- Urinary tract infections or UTI's (women aged 16 to 64 years)

Don't forget, your local pharmacy can also help you with generalised pain and swelling, sore throats, bites and stings, headaches, constipation and diarrhoea, colds and flu, mouth ulcers, tiredness, and vomiting.

If you contact us with an eye problem, our reception teams may signpost you to the Minor Eye Conditions Service (MECS). MECS is made up of a team of eye specialists who treat non-emergency eye conditions that do not need hospital attention. Conditions covered include acute red eyes, acute irritated or inflamed eyes, sticky discharge or acute watery eyes, in-growing eyelashes, foreign bodies in the eye and recently occurring flashes or floaters.

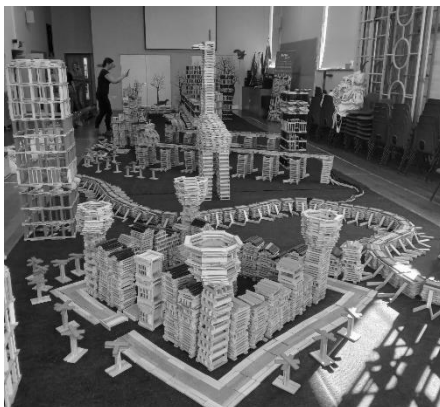
Finally, you can treat many minor illnesses such as colds and coughs, sore throats, and upset stomachs easily at home. Make sure you keep stocked up with health care essentials such as pain relief (paracetamol), cough and sore throat remedies, a first aid kit, upset stomach treatment, rehydration treatment and heartburn / indigestion treatment. Having these essentials at home will not only save you time, and help you feel better quicker, but will also help save the NHS much needed resources.

Great and Little Shelford School News

Several activities during March and April enabled pupils to demonstrate their talents outside the classroom, encompassing the school's aims to promote kindness, responsibility, creativity and resilience.

The KAPLA Bricks workshop lead by the owner, Jennifer, provided a fitting and popular centrepiece to STEM week. Many thousands of bricks, both plain and coloured were used to create impressive structures. Based on bricks previously spaced out on the floor each year group had an hour to complete their task. Jennifer described and demonstrated each stage, so all the pupils, however tentative initially, were able to take part fully.



A week later musicianship was celebrated with a concert in school time for young players. An evening concert the following day showcased the school orchestra playing some cheerful pieces.

Following a late Easter holiday the summer term began with a flurry – quite literally for the Reception class children. Each year the school purchases some “living eggs” to incubate. The children watch the chicks hatch, feed, grow in size, and begin to develop wing feathers until finally they are able to escape the special tray used when the whole class sits to observe them and talk about them. At which point they move on to good homes elsewhere.



At the other end of the school Year 6 embarked on their SATS tests. The process went smoothly, aided not only by the careful organisation but by the “second breakfast” treats provided to maintain energy levels.

Trips have taken place for other year groups - to the Botanic Gardens, the Centre for Computing History and Shepreth Wildlife Park. What a range of interesting activities. And the remaining half term looks just as stimulating.

SSYI 2024-2025 Annual Report

SSYI is a local Christian community youth charity that has been running for over 25 years, supporting young people in the villages of Great and Little Shelford, Stapleford, Sawston, Duxford and the surrounding area. It provides open access, targeted and activity based youth clubs, 1:1 support, schools work and more for local young people.

2024-2025, SSYI has experienced another year of meaningful progress and positive impact. Having our own space in Great Shelford - The SSYI Youth Centre - allows us to run a really varied selection of activities, from cooking based alternative provision sessions and targeted work, all the way to large open access youth clubs. This year, we've been able to take full advantage of our new minibus and trailer, bringing the football cage to local events like the Shelford Feast, the Little Shelford Family weekend and the Shelford Christmas Light Switch-On which has been a great success. Throughout the year, we have continued to support a growing number of young people dealing with issues related to substance misuse, including alcohol and drugs, alongside an increase in mental health challenges among those we work with. Youth provision is more important than ever!

One recent case study of our impact with a local young man

Ethan* is a young person who lives in the Shelfords. He initially attended our Friday youth club, and now regularly attends our Deeper sessions run by Tilly, one of our Youth Workers. Over the past couple of years, he has experienced tremendous personal growth. Initially shy and unsure, Ethan has grown in confidence and has become much more comfortable communicating with others. He has built some strong friendships through these sessions and has joined us on several trips too. The supportive environment and community have helped him build a stronger sense of self. His newfound confidence has not only improved his interactions within the group but also in other areas of his life, allowing him to face challenges with a positive mindset and a clearer sense of purpose. (*The name of this young person has been changed).

Our total impact across the Shelfords and beyond in 2024-2025:

- Over 300 young people regularly involved in our activities
- 1576 hours of face to face delivery over 12 months
- 100% of young people surveyed enjoy their time with SSYI
- Over 200 young people attending sessions in the Shelfords
- Over 100 residents of Great & Little Shelford involved in our activities

We need your help to continue our work in the Shelfords

We need your help in money or in time.

Funding for SSYI is a continuous challenge and currently costs over £140,000 per year to run. We get funding from our Parish Councils, Local Churches, the Village Feast and put a lot of effort into obtaining other Grant funds. One of our most reliable sources is regular private giving. **We have only 22 supporters who give regularly from £10 per month but, there are over 15,000 adult residents in the Villages we serve** so it's a tiny proportion who support us in this way. **We need your help and want to encourage you to become a regular donor.** In doing so you will get regular updates on our work and opportunities to meet our Youth Workers. During advanced training dogs are taught to lead a blind person, crossing roads safely and avoiding obstacles. Guide dogs are carefully matched with blind recipients such as owner Diane Rose who came with Zen. They have been together for several years and Zen has made a huge difference to Diane's life. She can access places that neither she nor Zen have been to before and have no fear of being in a tricky or dangerous position. What a lifeline for her. And for us, what an entertaining and informative evening.

At the 5th June WI meeting we will welcome Fiona Chesterton whose topic is 'Secrets never to be told – a story about an unexpected inheritance'. As usual visitors, and prospective new members will be made very welcome at 7.30pm in the Community Room behind St Mary's Church Great Shelford.

Are you passionate about your community?

Do you want to help make a long-lasting change?

Do you have innovative ideas for the council?

Do you have concerns about a specific issue and want to do something about it? If this is you, then we need you.

We need people from all backgrounds and experiences who reflect their community to put themselves forward for co-option to the Parish Council.

What do Parish Councillors do?

Little Shelford Parish Council is made up of 7 voluntary councillors. A full meeting is held every other month and a Planning Committee Meeting is held in the interim month. Issues are discussed that are important to the local community.

The Parish Council sets a proportion of local taxes to be spent in the Parish, comments on planning applications in the Parish and run projects that help maintain, improve or enhance the local area. Local Government is changing and Parish Councils are seeing an increase in the responsibilities and opportunities to influence decisions made that affect our local community.

To be eligible to be a Parish Councillor?

You have to be:

- a British citizen, an eligible Commonwealth citizen, a citizen of the Republic of Ireland, a qualifying EU citizen or an EU citizen with retained rights.
- over 18 years of age

Additionally, you have to be one of the following

- a local government elector for the council area for which you want to stand
- have during the whole of the 12 months occupied as owner or tenant any land or other premises in the council area or within 3 miles of it for the whole period
- have during that same period had your principal or only place of work in the council area or within 3 miles of it for the whole period.

History Snippet and related news

Highway Robbery

Rooting around the British Newspaper Archive, one of the oldest references to Little Shelford I could find was printed in the Ipswich Journal on 1st November 1777. Insight into life at the end of the 18th Century in Little Shelford and the surrounding area:

"On Saturday night fortnight, about 6 o'clock, the Reverend Mr Fisher, of Duxford in Cambridgeshire, on his return from Cambridge, was stopped on the road between Little Shelford and Whittlesford, by two highwaymen, who robbed him of 3 guineas and a quantity of silver. They were seen to follow Mr Fisher from this side of Trumpington, and soon after he passed through Shelford Turnpike, one of them enquired of the keeper of the toll gate, "whose carriage it was that had just gone by", and immediately followed, when one of them with imprecations stopped the driver, while the other rode up to the chaise door, and tapped to the window, which being let down, he held a pistol to Mr Fisher's breast, and commanded him instantly to deliver his money or he was a dead man, which was complied with. He then demanded his pocketbook, which Mr Fisher told him only contained some private memorandums. The Highway man's companion opening the opposite door of the carriage, with a large pistol in his hand, the pocketbook was then delivered, which the Highwaymen promised to return it if it contained nothing of value!"*

**Imprecations: Old English word for curse or offensive language according to the Cambridge Dictionary.*

The article raises a number of questions and perhaps our readers would like to see if they can answer them:

- (a) What were 3 guineas in 1777 worth in current day money?
- (b) Who was our King or Queen in 1777?
- (c) What kind of carriage had a "chaise" door?
- (d) And, most intriguing, where was Shelford Turnpike Toll gate?

The Flag Pole has been generously Brenda, Derek's wife and two other anonymous donors from within the village. Derek and Brenda lived in the village for over 50 years and both have been very active in all aspects of Village life.

Brenda inaugurated the Flag Pole hoisting the Union Flag at the 10th Anniversary Party for the new Pavilion on 25th March 2025. A plaque has also been placed on the Pavilion external wall close to the Flag Pole explaining that it has been erected in loving memory of Derek. It will fly the Union Flag on suitable occasions, such as the Village Feast and on

VE80 day and also the Cricket Club flag for home matches.
